

#### 2017 SCHOOL LAWS OF MONTANA

P-Card purchases for six months of the rebate year (April - September) totaled \$10.5 million with 128 school districts and special education cooperatives participating in the program. #### **Bus Standards Revised to Include House Bill 355**

The bus standards working group met at OPI in August to develop proposed revisions to the Montana School Bus Standards that include provisions in <a href="House Bill 355">House Bill 355</a>, passed in the 2017 Legislative Session. HB355 amended <a href="20-10-101">20-10-101</a> (4)(a) to include in the definition of a "school bus" a motor vehicle that "is district-owned, is designed to carry 10 or fewer passengers, has an overall safety rating of five stars from the national highway traffic safety administration at the time of purchase, and is insured in accordance with minimum coverage requirements set forth in 20-10-109." The proposed bus standards refer to this new type of school bus as Type E. HB 355 allows this vehicle to be used to transport students to and from school, and the route is eligible for state and county reimbursement at \$.50 per mile. #### **Bus Driver Maximum Driving Time**

Montana School Bus Standards require compliance with Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation 49 CFR 395.5, Maximum Driving Time for Passenger-Carrying Vehicles. School districts are encouraged to review these regulations to determine if your bus drivers are in compliance. The biggest concern is safety, and the main reason for the regulations is to keep fatigued drivers off the roadway. #### **NEED TO REPLACE A DIESEL-POWERED SCHOOL BUS?**

The Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is soliciting interest from K-12 schools or districts in **Flathead, Lake, Lewis and Clark, Lincoln, Missoula, Ravalli, Sanders, Silver Bow and Rosebud counties** to replace their model year **2001-2006 higher polluting diesel-powered C and D type school buses** with new, clean diesel or propane school buses. These counties have areas listed in EPA's FY 17 Priority County List, EPA's Green Book of Nonattainment Areas for Criteria Pollutants, and DEQ's "Communities at Risk for Fine Particulate Matter (PM2.5) Nonattainment." The application deadline is **November 15, 2017**. Click here for more information.

#### IMPORTANT REMINDERS FROM OPI

#### **Salary and Compensation Expenditure Report**

MAEFAIRS is currently open for the Salary and Compensation Expenditure Report, which requires that all employees who received a paycheck during the 2016-17 fiscal year be entered into the district's 2016-2017 TOE data. For many districts, the 2016-17 TOE did not include employees hired after the TEAMS application was closed. The missing employees can be entered into the compensation expenditure TOE screen in TEAMS. The Compensation Expenditure Report is due January 5, 2018. Contact Mari Haefka, 406.444.1960 if you have questions.

#### Changes to the FY2017 Trustees Financial Summary due <u>December 11, 2017</u>

Material coding errors on your FY2017 Trustees Financial Summary (TFS) may be corrected by submitting a revision to Mari Haefka or Nicole Thuotte in the OPI School Finance Division. As provided in ARM 10.10.504(6), changes to the TFS are limited to: 1) coding revisions between revenue and expenditure line items, or 2) revisions in the balance sheet accounts. In both cases, revisions are allowed provided no change occurs in the fund balance of the budgeted funds.

# Beyond the Butterflies



### Is it worry or anxiety?

It's normal to feel that nervous fluttering in your stomach from time to time. But, if you have worry that lasts and causes problems with daily living and relationships, making it hard to enjoy life, you may have generalized anxiety disorder (GAD).

Warning signs of GAD can include:

- Sleep problems
- · Tiredness and a bad mood
- Trouble focusing
- Endless worry about big or little things
- Tense or aching muscles
- · Shaking or feeling jumpy
- Sweating, unsettled stomach or loose stools
- · Shortness of breath or rapid heartbeat

About 40 million U.S. adults ages 18 and older suffer from various kinds of anxiety including:

- · Panio
- · Obsessive-compulsive thoughts
- · Post-traumatic stress disorder
- Phobias

If it's more than butterflies, don't wing it when it comes to your feelings. See a behavioral health professional right away, and help your anxiety take flight.

## Heading off post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD)

You may have heard of PTSD and think it's only about military combat. While that is a widely seen cause, PTSD is an anxiety disorder that can also happen after going through, or seeing, other upsetting events. These can include:

- Natural disasters
- · Terrorist incidents
- Accidents
- · Physical or sexual attack as a child or adult

If you have thoughts or dreams about a traumatic event that keep coming back, or if you sometimes feel as though the event is happening again, and it has lasted more than one month, you should talk to your doctor or behavioral health professional.

Recovering from PTSD takes time. Try these steps to help with coping and recovery:

- Step up family and social contacts to get support.
- Take a relaxing walk, listen to soothing music or read a favorite book.
- · Get moving with physical activity to help your mood and sleep, boost energy, and ease tension.
- Rest your mind with plenty of sleep (seven to nine hours each night) to mend from stress.
- Keep a daily record of your thoughts to help you work through issues.
- Skip drugs and alcohol, which can make symptoms worse and may lead to addiction problems.
- · Curb caffeine, which can trigger worry that may also disturb your sleep.
- Reach out to others by volunteering. It will improve your self-respect, and you will gain purpose
  and a sense of success.
- · Nix the news or other TV programs if watching will disturb your sleep.

When you know the signs and ways to cope, you can win the battle against PTSD and get back to enjoying your life.
