HOUSE BILL 351 – TRANSFORMATIONAL LEARNING GRANT OPPORTUNITY

<u>House Bill 351</u> created a new section of law in Title 20 and amended 20-9-116, MCA to support transformational learning. The bill establishes a flexible system that includes: customized learning to address each pupil's strengths, needs and interests; continued focus on each pupil's proficiency over content; and actively engaging each pupil in determining what, how, when and where learning occurs.

Funding and expenditures for transformational learning will be tracked in the **Flexibility Fund**. School districts that *meet certain conditions* are eligible to fund their transformational learning program with:

- a state transformational learning aid payment for a period of 4 consecutive years,
- a local match up to the amount received from the state through a permissive levy in the Flexibility Fund*, and
- transfers of state and local revenue from any budgeted or nonbudgeted fund (except debt service and retirement) to the Flexibility Fund

*must be disclosed on the Notice of Intent to Increase Non-Voted Levies (20-9-116, MCA)

A school district must apply for the state transformational aid payment during the application period, which is October 1 – November 1, 2019 for FY2020. Funding is provided by submitting an application to the Office of Public Instruction for approval by the Board of Public Education. HB 351 Section 2(3)(b) states, "On an annual basis, the board of public education shall: (b) qualify districts that submit an application meeting the requirements of subsection (2) for the funding in subsection (4) and the flexibilities in subsection (5) until the annual appropriation is exhausted, after which further applications, including first-time applications and annual reports requesting an expansion of a previously approved plan, are to be deferred for consideration in a subsequent year, in the order of date received, if and when additional funds become available for distribution;"

Accordingly, the OPI will time and date stamp the applications as they are received. The total appropriation for the 2020-2021 biennium is \$2.6 million. The estimated FY2020 state transformation learning aid payments is \$1,033,151. These will be distributed no later than June 30, 2020.

TIPS FOR A HEALTHY AND HAPPY SUMMER

Summer is the perfect time to turn off the tube, get off the couch, head outside, and explore. These tips will help to keep the fun going while ensuring health and happiness.

STAY HYDRATED—DRINK PLENTY OF WATER

High temps during summertime can increase the amount of water we need to consume. The typical recommendation is 64 oz. of water per day, but with additional moderate physical activity, your water intake needs can double.

EAT FRESH, SEASONAL, AND LOCAL PRODUCE

Watermelon, tomatoes, cantaloupes, cucumbers, summer squash, and berries-to name a few—are yummy foods that are abundant during the summer. These delicious fruits and veggies are filled with healing nutrition and nourishing juices. For example, watermelon is high in lycopene, a compound with strong antioxidant properties that protect the body from aging and inflammation. Fruits of summer are jam-packed with minerals and vitamins, including magnesium and Vitamin C, which are lacking in the diets of many Americans.

CLOCK ADEQUATE SLEEP

Generally speaking, the more physically active you are, the more rest your body requires. Experts estimate that over 40% of American have difficulty sleeping and suffer from sleep deprivation, a condition that predicts medical issues later in life.

When possible, adopt a bedtime routine. Avoid eating and working late.
